BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

Here at Bryant, staff, students and families will collaborate to build a safe, respectful and responsible community. We (staff, students and families) are on the same team with the same goal – successful, responsible and respectful children.

Students are expected to:

1. **WORK** – do what’s expected and bring the materials needed to do it
2. **RESPECT** – treat yourself, others and property appropriately
3. **BELONG** – be a positive member of Bryant and make others feel included

During the 2019-2020 school year we will be continuing the use of a system of Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) throughout the school district. Our plan is to teach, model, and acknowledge positive behaviors for all students in each specific setting at Bryant. We will celebrate students who demonstrate expected behaviors and continue to teach those who need extra help demonstrating appropriate behaviors. A group of our staff will meet monthly to analyze the data collected from office referrals to determine the specific needs of the students at Bryant.

NO TOLERANCE BEHAVIORS

Some behaviors are intolerable and illegal. If a student chooses to engage in these behaviors, immediate action must be taken. Parents/Guardians will be contacted to create a plan – this plan may include in-school or out of school suspension, charges filed, and/or an intense behavior plan. If parents can not be reached, other names on the emergency card will be called. If necessary, Police Liaison Officer Kendall will be contacted.

No Tolerance Behaviors:

- ① Possession of tobacco, drugs, alcohol, weapons or weapon replicas - Board Policy
- ② Starting fires or knowingly setting fire alarms
- ③ Vandalism/damage to school or personal property of others - Board Policy
- ④ Leaving the school building property and refusing to immediately return
- ⑤ Harassment, including sexual harassment
- ⑥ Physical assault, Threatening others, Causing injury to others and terrorist threats
- ⑦ Malicious disrespect and refusal to follow adult directives; including defiance, swearing, hand gestures
- ⑧ Uncontrollable behavior in need of physical restraint
- ⑨ Theft

ATTENDANCE:

Attending school regularly has a huge impact on a student’s academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Building this habit early so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is so important. Good attendance will not only help them be more successful in school but those habits carry with them into college and at work.

Chapter 118.15(1)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, requires that any person (parent, guardian, foster parent, or relative placement) having under their control (has responsibility for) a student who is between the ages of six and eighteen years shall cause the student to attend school regularly (religious holidays excepted) during all scheduled hours, full-time until the end of the term, quarter, or semester of the school year in which the student becomes eighteen years of age, graduates, or is relieved of school attendance with a legal excuse.

Parents or guardians have the right to excuse a student's absence from school, for any or no reason, by notifying the school of the student's absence. Parents must call within 24 hours of the absence or it will be considered unexcused. A student may be excused for up to ten days per year under this provision Wis. Stat § 118.15(3)(c).

More than five unexcused absences in one school semester is considered habitual truancy under this provision Wis. Stat. sec 118.16(1)(a) and (c).

When absences involve a contagious illness, contact the school nurse to report such illness.

PROPER DRESS CODE:

School is a child's "place of work" and it is important that children dress accordingly. School clothing should be modest and suitable for the season and daily activity. It is often cool in our building so please dress appropriately for the weather. Students who wear inappropriate clothing to school will be asked to turn it inside-out for the remainder of the day, given an alternate item if possible, or parents will be contacted to bring a change of clothing.

Prohibited clothing items in school:

No head coverings: hats, bandanas, scarves etc.

No rollerblades, skateboards or heelys

No spaghetti strap shirts, halter tops or bare midriff when arms are raised, short shorts, ultra miniskirts, transparent (see through) clothing

No advertisements for alcohol or tobacco, violence or erotic illustrations on clothing, gang related clothing

No heavy-link chains or spikes

Please **label** all clothing items, including outerwear and backpacks, with the child's name. Some days the children will be in physical education and everyday they will be outside for noon recess (except in the case of inclement weather) so appropriate clothing is required for those occasions, including appropriate footwear.

WINTER/RECESS: During winter we continue to go outside for recess and we reference the NOAA, National Weather Service wind-chill chart for safety. It is our hope that children can be outside as much as possible, so please make sure that they have snow pants, jackets, boots, hats and mittens during the winter months.

HOMEWORK POLICY

Each child will be issued a red homework folder at the start of the year. Every child is responsible for completing homework each day, practicing the skills they learn in the classroom. Homework has been proven to have a direct impact on student achievement. Please help your child be more successful by checking and signing their homework as indicated. Those students who do not complete their homework will be given the opportunity to do so during their recess time at Homework Club.

SCHOOL VISITS:

Parents are welcome to visit the school. Please sign in and obtain a visitor badge in the office when you arrive. Teachers will appreciate a phone call ahead of time if you would like to visit or volunteer. If you have a specific concern and would like to conference with a teacher, please make an appointment so you are sure that the teacher can spend the time necessary to address your concern.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION:

The emergency contact information is very important - should it be necessary to contact you in cases of illness, accident or early school closing. If schools should close early because of snow or other circumstances, we will follow the instructions you have provided on the emergency card. We ask that you update this information electronically each year.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION: This information MUST be kept current, please help us by notifying your child's teacher or the main office if any information changes (Address/Phone numbers). It is essential that we have contact information in case of an emergency.

CUSTODY CONCERNS:

**** IF THERE IS A CUSTODY CONCERN AS TO WHOM WE SHOULD RELEASE YOUR CHILD/CHILDREN, WE MUST HAVE A COPY OF THE COURT ORDER FOR OUR FILES. IF YOU DO NOT NOTIFY US, WE ASSUME NEUTRALITY AND COULD RELEASE THE CHILD TO EITHER PARENT.**

HEALTH SERVICES - BRYANT ELEMENTARY:

Elementary schools will offer full time health service during the school year. The health assistant will be scheduled at the school from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. each day. Please communicate health concerns/medication needs with the health assistant.

MEDICATIONS:

Before any non-prescribed medication or treatment may be administered, prior written consent of the parent is required. Medications will be administered according to district guidelines. Students are not to bring non-prescription medications to school for self-administration or for distribution or sale to other students.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION:

All children in grades kindergarten through fifth are required to wear athletic shoes in the gymnasium for physical education class. We ask that all students have Velcro or tie shoes only, and no black soled gym shoes, please. Because of safety reasons, sandals and slip-ons are not allowed. Please label shoes with your child's name for easy identification. If your child is unable to participate in physical education, please contact the teacher and the health assistant and provide a physician's excuse.

BREAKFAST, LUNCH AND MILK PROGRAM:

Breakfast is free for all students at Bryant, while snack milk and lunch fees are based upon free and reduced status. Please pay in advance using one of the following methods:

1. www.myschoolbucks.com
2. Use the outdoor deposit box at the Administration building.
3. Call Shelby or Cheryl with a credit/debit card payment. 715-394-8707
4. Use our automatic withdrawal system with credit cards and checking.

5. All school cafeterias accept payments.
6. Mail a payment to Food Service at 3025 Tower Ave.
7. Make a payment directly to our Food Service staff at Bryant.

If you think that you may qualify for free or reduced lunch please fill out the application that will be provided to you on the first day of school, or you can fill one out online at www.superior.k12.wi.us under Food Service. Even if you feel that you will not be using the lunch program at school and you qualify for free or reduced lunch, you are encouraged to fill out an application. Your approved application will assist our school in qualifying for Title I federal funding. If your child's lunch account runs out of money, we offer a peanut butter sandwich. Any questions should be directed to Jamie Wilson, Director of Food Service at (715) 394-8707.

TRANSPORTATION:

Transportation is provided to all district elementary students whose registered home address is at least two miles from the school attended, provided this address lies within the defined attendance area for that specific school. All eligible students are expected to ride to and from the same assigned bus stop on the same assigned bus on a consistent daily basis.

Parents of eligible students who wish to request a variance from the above, must submit requests in writing to their child's school. Requested stops of bus assignment changes must be documented using the appropriate form and approved by the principal in consultation with all school bus drivers affected by the change. Changes may be approved providing the following minimum conditions are met:

- ① There is adequate space available on the bus or buses
- ② The designated route of the bus or buses is not altered.

Bus variances may be for one day only or for a longer period of time. However, they must be pre-approved. There must be ample time for this approval to take place. **DO NOT ASSUME THAT A NOTE SENT TO SCHOOL IN THE MORNING IS AN AUTOMATIC APPROVAL.**

Variance transportation forms are available in the school office. At times bus referrals are received by students who have misbehaved on the bus. Possible suspension from riding the school bus may be a consequence for misbehavior. Help your child know that the bus driver must maintain order on the bus for the safety of the children riding. Children must use the crosswalks when crossing the parking lot to the cars. **Please contact the Transportation Department with any questions/concerns you have at (715)394-8706, David See, Director.**

USE OF OFFICE PHONE:

*Students have access to the school phones for **emergency situations only**.* All phone calls **MUST** be approved by a staff member. We encourage children to make after-school social arrangements outside of school time.

INVITATIONS / BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS:

Students are usually anxious to share their birthdays with their friends. When a birthday treat is sent to school, health requirements dictate that the treat is commercially prepared with ingredients listed. Birthday invitations or other party invitations should not be sent to school for distribution, please distribute them outside of school or through the mail.

NEWSPAPER/TV PICTURES:

From time to time students in school have the chance or opportunity to have their pictures in the newspaper or on TV. Most families welcome the event but some may not want to be

involved. If you **DO NOT** wish to have your child participate, **please call our office.**

APPOINTMENTS:

If your child has a dental or medical appointment, they should come to school before or after, if possible, to avoid being marked absent for that half day. You will need to send a note to your child's teacher and sign your child in and out of the office. If your child will be absent for half a day or more, get a signed note from the doctor or dentist so it can be marked as medically excused on their attendance.

TAKING CHILDREN FROM SCHOOL:

Because of the danger involved in a student being picked up by an unauthorized person, it is very important that you, as a parent, send a note if you know beforehand that you must have your child dismissed from school. If you are picking up your child before 3:15, come to the office and we will call your child down.

END OF DAY DISMISSALS:

It is important that your child remain in school until the end of each school day **3:27**, unless an emergency occurs. We are busy learning all the way up until that time. Due to safety concerns all doors are locked during school hours. If you are picking your child up at the close of the day, please wait outside until the bell rings at 3:27. After the bell rings you are welcome to have a meeting spot for your family, or pick your child up in their classroom. This will allow your child's teacher to complete the school day without unnecessary interruptions. Bussers will meet in the gym at 3:27 to wait for their bus to arrive.

INSURANCE:

The School District does not provide health or accident insurance for injuries involving your child at school. You are encouraged to review your present health family plan to determine if your coverage is adequate. For your benefit, plan is available at a cost. Information regarding this plan will be coming to you. If you choose to sign up for this plan, you are responsible for submitting any claim necessary.

REPORT CARDS:

Report cards are emailed to all families at the close of each trimester. Please make sure your email is up to date.

INTERNET:

Bryant School is wired for internet access and it is used as a learning tool under supervision by school staff. If you wish that your child not be allowed access, notify your child's teacher. Please see the School District of Superior Technology/Internet Use Policy 7540.

SCHOOL NEWSLETTER:

A newsletter including school and community information is sent out weekly via email and posted to our Bryant Facebook page.

PERSONAL ITEMS

Electronic Devices, Cell Phones, Personal Cameras & Security Cameras

Personal electronic devices will not to be used by students during the school day and should be off and stored in backpacks, in lockers at all times during the school day. Examples of these items are cell phones, music players, electronic games, cameras, etc. Students using or displaying personal electronic equipment on school grounds during the school day will have the item confiscated by a staff member and brought to the office where it will be returned at the end of the day. Subsequent incidents will result in the need for a parent to be contacted

and to come and pick up the item.

The school is equipped with security cameras. These cameras are located within the school and covering the school grounds. By law, students, parents and community members must be made aware that these cameras are recording all activity twenty-four hours per day.

Skateboarding, Roller Blades, Scooters, Bikes and other like items

Scooters, bikes, roller blades, skateboards, and other like items will not be allowed for use in the building or on school grounds. Students must have their own locking mechanisms and use bike racks on the school grounds to keep items like these secure. The school district will not be held responsible for theft or vandalism. Roller blades, skateboards, other like items must be carried into the school once the student is on school grounds and placed in the student's locker. Items too large for locker storage should be left at home.

Toys, Spray Aerosols and Valuables:

It is the practice of Bryant School to discourage playthings (fidget spinners, dolls, toys, play cars, etc.) at school. Toys can be a distraction to the learning environment and will be taken away if they are getting in the way of students focusing on learning. Play items also cause confusion on our school buses. These things become damaged or lost. If students bring these items to school, they are at their own risk and the school will not be responsible to investigate or replace lost or stolen items.

Due to allergies and sensitivities to strong odors, students are not allowed to bring spray aerosols, colognes or other spray items containing strong odors to school.

LOST AND FOUND:

All articles found should be turned into the office. Valuable items will be kept in the office and will be returned to the owner upon identification. Clothing items are kept in the back entryway. Periodically, the large bin in the entryway will be emptied and donated to local charities. Please make sure and label all personal items and they will be returned to you if found.

TOBACCO FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Since August 1, 1989, the School District of Superior has been tobacco free. The use of tobacco on any grounds or in any building is prohibited. Signs have been posted and clearly display the policy. No illegal drugs are allowed on the school property.
